# 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten

The St. Clair County Library System (SCCLS) has many tools and resources that help our patrons build and nurture a lifelong love of reading. For many, their relationship with literacy begins long before they've spoken or read their first word – and may even start right here in the library.

Whether reading together for the first time or actively preparing for Kindergarten, each branch serves as a vital resource for early development. In 2024, SCCLS will add several early literacy and phonics take-home kits to our burgeoning Library of Things. This means families will have access to expertly-curated collections featuring much-beloved characters ranging from Marvel heroes to Paw Patrol to Pete the Cat – all completely free of charge and available throughout the county!

In addition, SCCLS will be offering patrons the chance to participate in the upcoming “1,000 Books Before Kindergarten” initiative. To participate, families will set a goal to read a minimum of 1,000 books to and with their children before the first day of Kindergarten begins. Families will have the opportunity to register at any one of our eleven branches. As this is a self-paced program, families can move at their own speed and choose titles they enjoy. As always, our staff will remain ready and available to provide recommendations upon request.

Logging can be done via mobile application or paper log, and children will earn prizes at key milestones. This format may be familiar to those who participate in our annual Summer Reading program. The best part? Storytimes here at the library, daycare, or even during preschool count, too! Weather permitting, our StoryWalks at the Fort Gratiot County Park and the Marysville Park can serve as yet another wonderful resource, allowing families to enjoy the outdoors and read as they walk. Titles that count towards Summer Reading also work towards 1,000 Books – offering plenty of incentives to keep reading all year.

We look forward to sharing more details with our patrons in early 2024!

# Safe Spaces

One way libraries serve children and their families is by offering safe spaces where kids and their caregivers can practice social development skills, whether by playing in the library with other kids they just met or attending storytimes.

In the Children's Library at the Port Huron/Main Library, we've recently heard several parents express concern that because of isolation during the recent pandemic, maybe their preschoolers don't have the degree of social development skills they should have at this age. They may need to be more interactive with other kids or need help sharing. Taking turns might be a foreign concept, or they're uncomfortable addressing adults outside their family. They might have some difficulty recognizing nuanced facial expressions, and caregivers often seem embarrassed by their child's behavior - they may be worried that others are judging either their kids or their parenting. We get it, and we're here to help.

Some of the skills we practice in storytime focus on how to behave in a group setting. Examples are sitting without encroaching on someone else's personal space, waiting to talk until it's your turn, and having fun dancing wildly - but not so wildly that you accidentally kick your neighbor. Storytime is a place to start learning these skills; we don't expect kids to have them down before they come. Sometimes, we have a broad range of ages of kids attending, so kids have a chance to learn what they might be able to expect older or younger children to be able to do. In the Children's Library at the Port Huron branch, we have the space to allow kids to opt out as they need, so if they're not able to sit still for the entire story or aren't that into a particular song or rhyme, they can take a break in our nearby play area, while still participating merely through awareness of the nearby program. They can return to group activities when ready, which may help foster decision-making and awareness skills.

While there are some other wonderful opportunities in St. Clair County for kids to develop these early social skills, the library is one of the few places where it's absolutely free of charge.

## Staff Kudos

Janet Curtiss, Public Service Coordinator at the St. Clair County Library System (SCCLS), presented a brief history of the St. Clair County Poor Farm and the people who lived there at the Local History and Genealogy Section Satellite Meeting on Thursday, August 17, 2023, in Leuven, Belgium. The meeting theme was “Innovative Approaches in Engaging People with Local History and Genealogy,” and was part of the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA) World Congress 2023 in Rotterdam, Netherlands.

“It’s a great honor for me to represent the SCCLS on an international level,” said Janet, “and I’m overwhelmed by the support of my colleagues at the library and our Library Board of Trustees. The importance and value of the Poor Farm ledger as a resource for local history and genealogy research has been proved multiple times; several library patrons have discovered answers to research questions that could not have been found anywhere else. The ability of SCCLS to offer access to resources like this proves the necessity for free and open access to information and the continued existence and growth of public libraries, which are supported by their local communities. I’m grateful for the opportunity to share my research on the Poor Farm with a global audience.”

Before her current role, Janet Curtiss worked as the Reference Librarian for Special Collections at SCCLS for six years, mainly focusing on the local history and genealogy collection in the library’s Michigan Room. Her interest in and research of the County Poor Farm began when a ledger for the Poor Farm was donated to the library.

The Poor Farm ledger offers a glimpse into the lives of county residents who needed support due to their circumstances in life. It documents an otherwise unrepresented population and is a valuable resource for researchers. SCCLS has digitized this ledger with funds from a grant from the Michigan State Historical Records Advisory Board through funding from the National Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC) National Archives and Records Administration.

## Take a Virtual Tour of the Library

You can now take a virtual tour of every St. Clair County Library System (SCCLS) library branch courtesy of Able Eyes.

Able Eyes was inspired by a place of accessibility to help people with both physical and invisible disabilities (Autism, Anxiety, PTSD) more easily access their community and travel by exploring places first from the comfort of home to assess accessibility and decrease anxiety before difficult or new transitions.

What is a Virtual Tour? Virtual Tours use 360 photos stitched together to provide a virtual walk-thru opportunity of the library branch prior to entering the environment. These tours decrease anxiety by providing a predictable visual navigation opportunity of the location. These virtual tours can be accessed from any device by going to the SCCLS website at: <https://stclaircountylibrary.org/locations>, clicking on your chosen site, and then clicking on the virtual tour.

## Coming in 2024 SCCLS Makerspace!

The Port Huron/Main Library makerspace will be an area where patrons can learn about, design, and create various DIY projects with the latest technology. The space will be communal, where patrons can learn new skills and utilize non-traditional library services such as 3D printers, laser engraving machines, laminators, and similar electronics. There will also be digital conversion equipment that will allow you to convert old VHS, cassette tapes, and Super 8 reels to digital files.

We look forward to bringing these services to our community and continuing to connect you to a world of information in 2024.

## Quiet Moments....

Hi,

I am a parent of 2 boys who thoroughly enjoy the St. Clair County Library System. During the pandemic we found out we could request library books and do a curbside pickup. For a family who didn't go in anywhere for a very long time, it was magnificent! We would request 50 books at a time sometimes, and use them for homeschool, as well as for reading pleasure. Frequently when we brought home a bag or two of books, we would let the kids check them out and read as soon as we got home. Every time we would set the bags in the living room, there would be silence as the boys - one 8 and one 4, read/looked at the books. This silence continued for 45 minutes! The quote in our household became, ***"this quiet moment brought to you by the St. Clair County Library."*** Even though we go in now, we still find that anytime we pick up a bag or two of books, the boys will read for about the same amount of time - if not more! They check out each book. The older one reads, the younger one looks at the books. Often the older one reads to the younger one. We have come to adore this sometimes much needed break from the normal chaos that is life with two young boys. The quote has been used time and time again in our household.

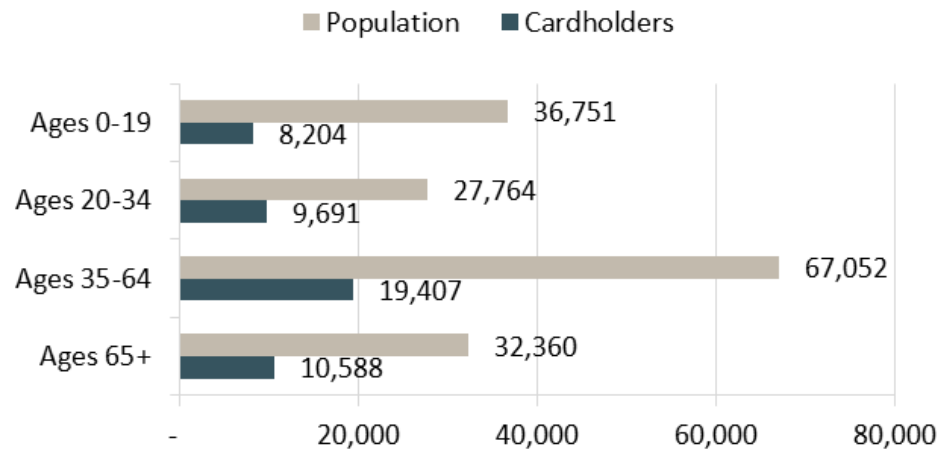
Thank you, for all of the quiet moments you have given us, always so much appreciated by everyone in our home, and for all of those yet to come. We are a book-loving family, and we love our library.

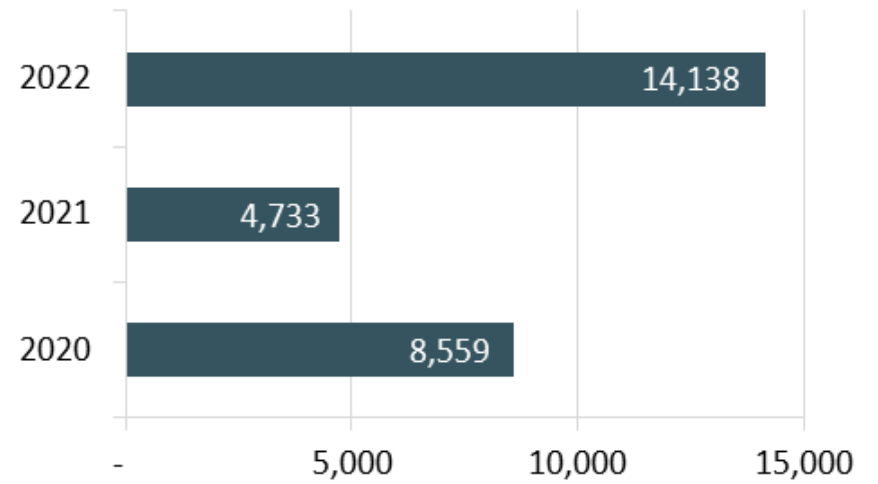


# SCCLS Library Statistics - 2022

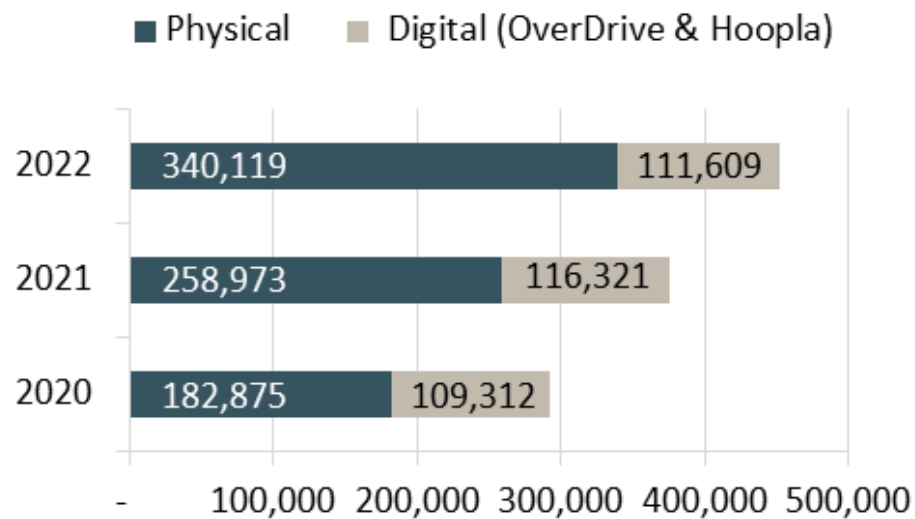
## County Population and Cardholder Demographics



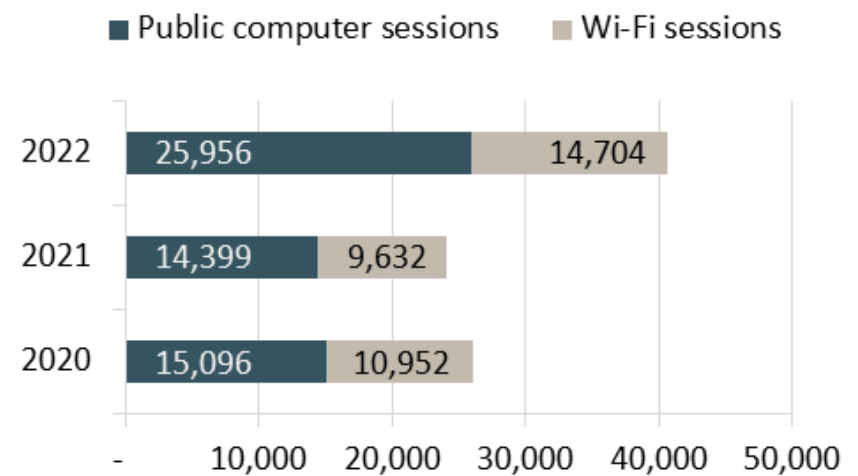
## Program Attendance



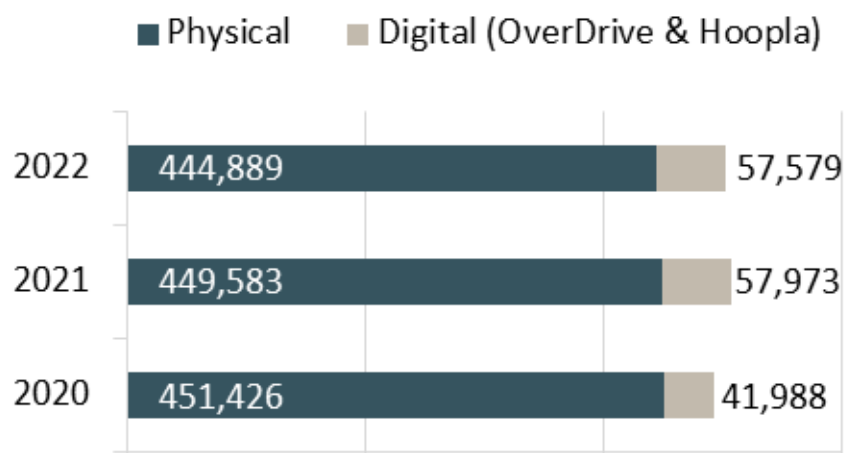
## Items Circulated



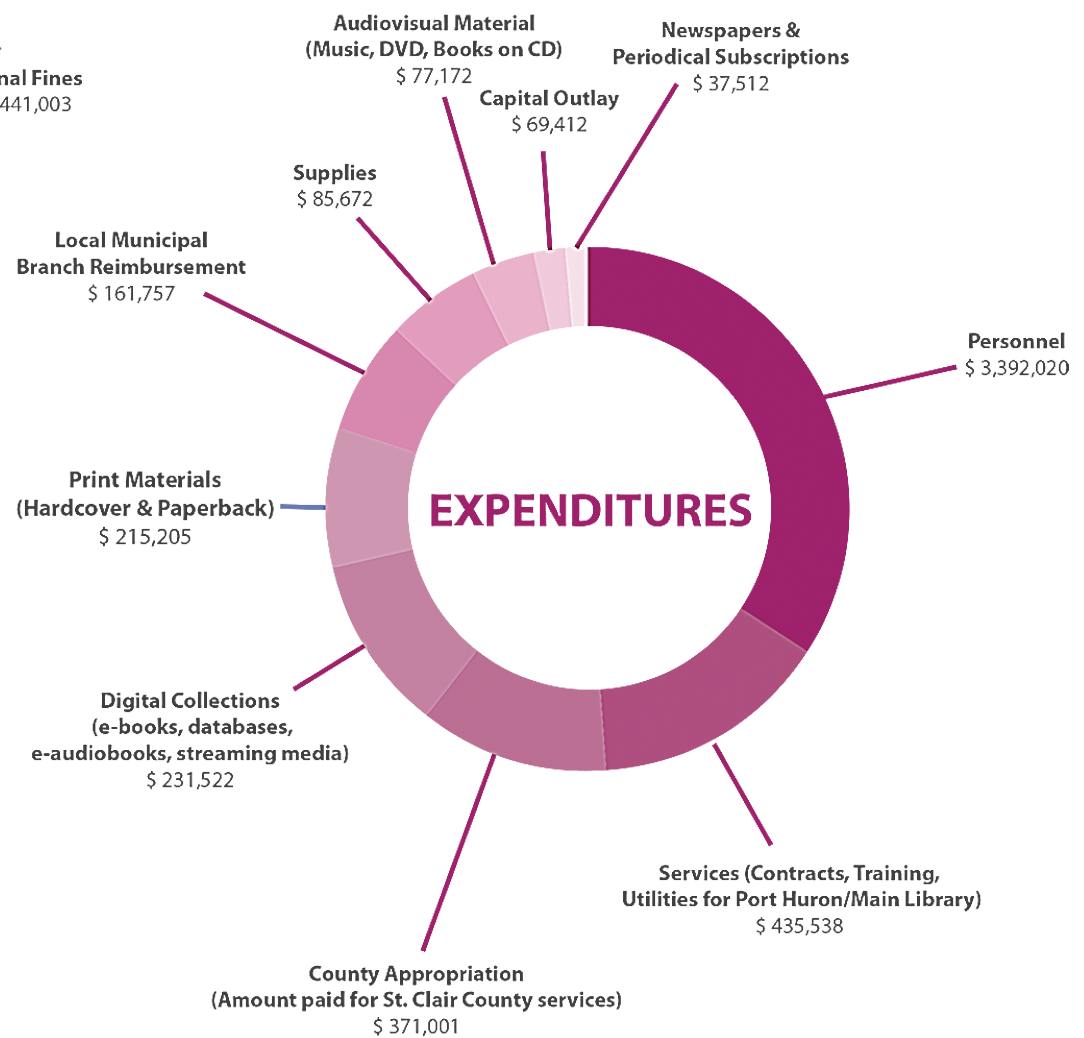
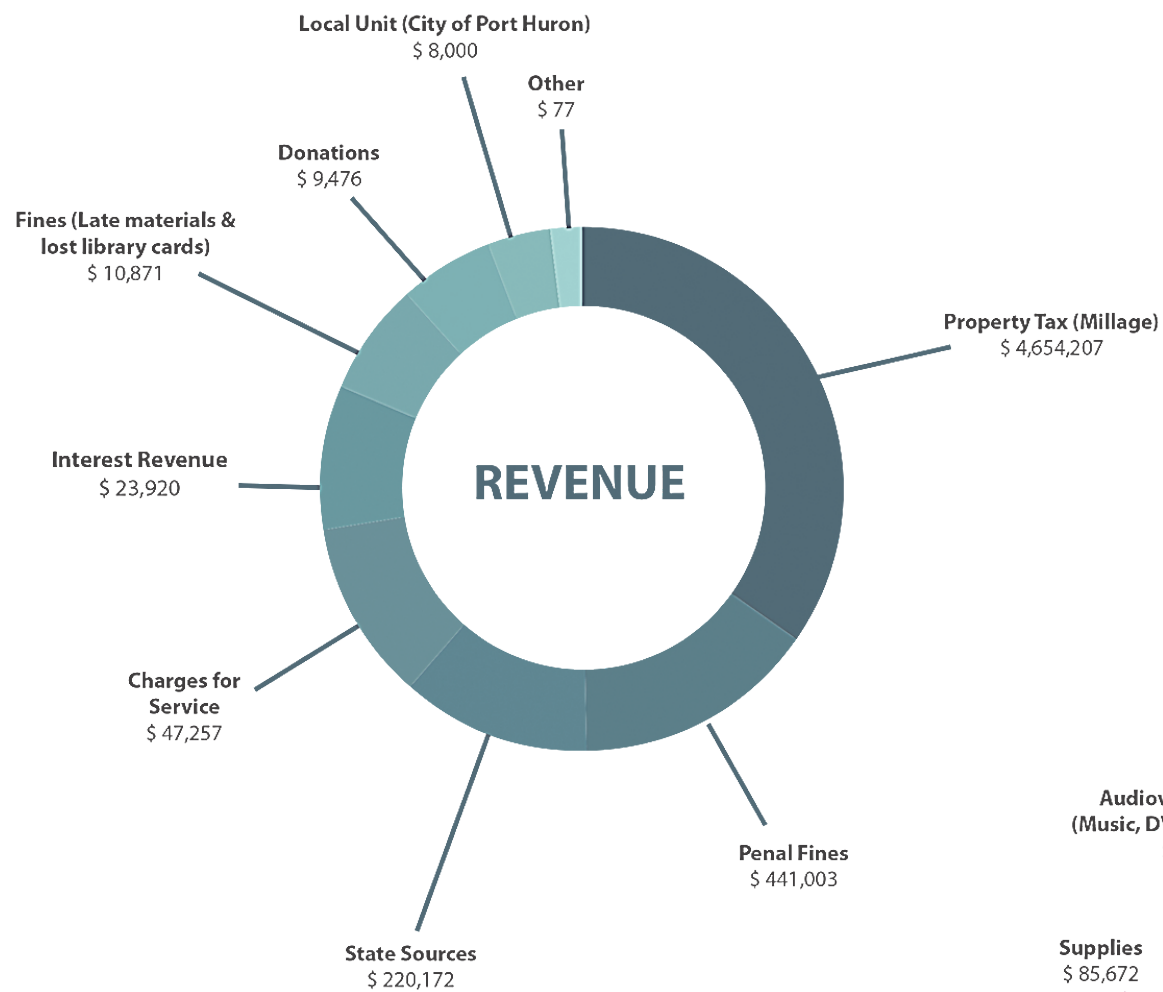
## Computer and Wi-Fi Use
