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Capac Library Celebrates Expansion

Last November, the Capac Library branch celebrated a building expansion that nearly doubled the size of the library!

The new addition to the Capac Library was truly a community effort. Funding for the purchase of the empty building adjacent to the library was spearheaded by the Friends of the Capac Library, the DDA, the Village of Capac, memorial donations, and various fundraisers by private citizens. Library patron and licensed contractor John Carrier volunteered his work and served as project manager.

"The early members of the Friends of the Capac Library always saw the need for a larger facility. This is the fruition of their work and their fundraising efforts to this end," said Nancy Godinez, Capac Library Branch Lead.

The purchase process began in 2013. Renovations to the building began in the summer of 2014 and were completed in the fall of 2015. The majority of the work was done by local volunteer help. Their love for the library can be seen in every brick restored, every inch of flooring refinished, and every book in its place. Perfect library feng shui. The result is a renovation the Capac community can truly be proud of!

The expansion was celebrated at an open house on November 12 with many patrons, Friends, and library staff in attendance. State Representative Dan Lauwers read a proclamation and Senator Phil Pavlov,

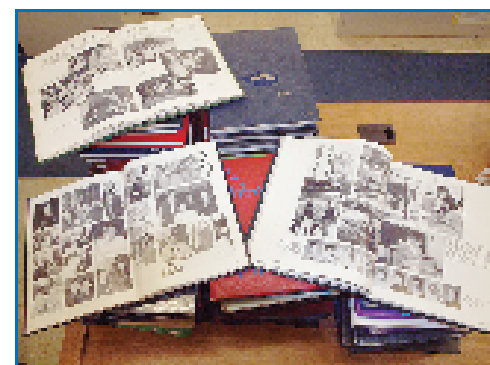
busy working on outreach visits to schools, business functions, and other community events, to help promote all the wonderful services that your millage dollars help provide.

Digitization Of Yearbooks

In an effort to make special collections more accessible to patrons, the St. Clair County Library System has begun a project to digitize yearbooks from St. Clair County high schools. This project will be completed by late spring at no cost to the Library, thanks to the services provided by OCI Records Conversion. OCI has offered free yearbook digitization to high schools and libraries throughout the country, including several libraries in Michigan. In order to supplement the St. Clair County Library's yearbook collection, library patrons and community institutions have lent us their volumes for a few short months during the digitization process. We thank them profusely for helping us develop a digital collection that is as complete as possible.



Digitizing the yearbooks also aids in preservation of the print copies. When patrons can view the digital files, it means less handling of the books themselves. This helps minimize wear and tear on the bindings, covers, and pages. Digitization also provides a backup copy of the print yearbooks. When this project is complete, patrons will be able to view the yearbooks from home by visiting our website, www.stclaircountylibrary.org, or by coming into the Library and using patron computers.

Library For The Blind and Physically Handicapped

The St. Clair County Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped (LBPH) is now an Advisory and Outreach Center (AOC). This free service provides reading materials (large print & audio) and equipment for anyone who is unable to use standard print materials due to vision or physical disabilities. This change was made in January and the only difference that patrons will notice is your audiobooks are now being sent from the regional Library in Lansing. This change was made so staff has more time to devote to outreach into the communities we serve.



We are still here to answer your phone calls, provide readers advisory service, and make any changes to your library account or reading preferences. Some

of the front desk staff at the Port Huron Branch have also been trained to take your calls in the event that LBPH staff are unavailable.

Please remember to return each audiobook as soon as you can. Doing so will keep a constant flow of books coming to you from Lansing.

Your large print service will remain the same and will continue to be sent from the Port Huron Branch.

To Database Or Not To Database? That Is The Question

Does the word “database” intimidate you? Do you think of it as something only tech-savvy people can use? Don’t worry! Although databases are intricate on the inside, they are very easy to navigate and have a broad range of uses for all ages. Whether you’re in high school, college, seeking a job, or looking to learn who your ancestors were, databases are for you! Your library offers over 25 databases, covering a broad range of information for you to explore. To access the databases all you need is your Library card and access to the internet. To begin, simply go to www.stclaircountylibrary.org, click on [Find Information](#) and select [Library Databases](#).

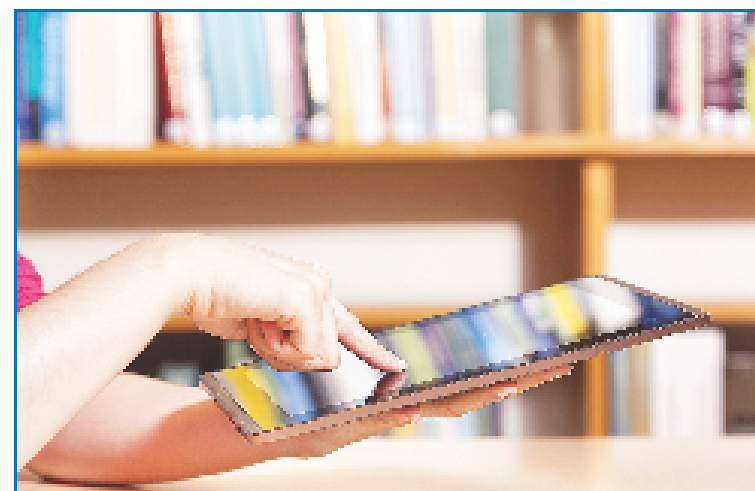
Here’s a fun fact for those of you who are still in high school or college. Did you know that when you reference an article or journal found on our databases, it counts as print source for your research paper? *Academic OneFile*, *CollegeSource*, and *Gale Virtual Reference Library* are databases that house information from encyclopedias and full-text articles from the world’s leading peer-reviewed journals. Databases make gathering information for a research paper really easy. Within a matter of minutes you can have several vetted sources with accurate information that is relevant to your paper, without having to travel.

Interested in exploring the world? Or maybe you want to learn more information about your ancestors? No need to spend money on expensive tools. *Mango Languages* and *Ancestry Library Edition* have everything you need. Of the 71 languages offered on *Mango*, 20 have the *Mango Conversations* tool, which will prepare you to have a conversation right from the start. *Ancestry Library Edition* contains census, vital, church, court, and immigration records from the United States, United Kingdom, Canada and more, creating a database of names stretching into the billions. *Ancestry Library Edition* is only accessible in the Library.

Databases aren’t just for teens and adults; your Library also has databases geared for children. *TumbleBooks* will help your child to learn how to read with books that sound out letters and words. Then, when they are ready to start school, *Kids InfoBits* will teach them beginning research skills through a kid-friendly interface that will help them from Kindergarten through 5th grade!

Just think, the databases mentioned above are only a small selection of what your Library has to offer. Need some help fixing your car? There is the *Chilton Automotive* database. Looking to further your education? Try *Gale Courses*. Local newspaper archives? Try the *Times Herald* database. Legal information? There is *LegalTrac*. There is something for everyone.

So, if you don’t have a Library card, now is the time to stop in to your nearest branch and sign up to gain access to a world of information right at your fingertips. Your local library staff will be happy to get you up and running with databases in no time!



Do You Hoopla?

Hoopla is a streaming service that lets you borrow free digital movies, music, television shows, comics, eBooks and audiobooks. It is simple to access and use, without the hassle of having to return items you've borrowed. And no late fees or wait lists!

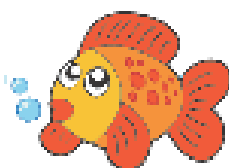

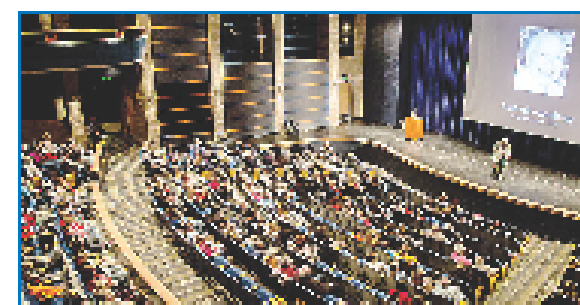

Government Docs: Our Public Literature

Government information can conjure up images of books full of statistics and regulations. However, government information is much more than a place to review current immigration policies, find census information, and understand business investments. Government information provides a snapshot of what is currently happening in society. From the technical aspects of what we know about Mars to the latest research on breast cancer. From our military involvement in wars past and present, to weather warnings and the daily record of the United States President, government documents are our public literature.

As one of the few select federal depository libraries in Michigan, and the only one in the 10th Congressional District, the St. Clair County Library System has been providing access to authenticated federal information since 1876. That is 140 years of useful information to help citizens in our community make informed decisions, connect with government officials, and increase knowledge about all branches of government and its impact on our lives. As the federal government has transitioned to electronic documents and archives, so has the Library. This transition allows another conduit for the library to provide access to federal information.

We now offer via our website (www.stclaircountylibrary.org) authenticated federal government materials. From the library's home page under the **Collections** tab, locate **Government Documents and Resources**. Some of the links provided include the *Occupational Outlook Handbook* where career information can be found including average salaries, projected employment opportunities and necessary education and training for



hundreds of career paths. Those who are transitioning into new careers or high school graduates considering college or apprentice paths will find this information useful for their future planning. Buying a car? Find average fuel costs through side-by-side comparisons on new and older vehicles in the *Fuel Economy Guide*. If your interests are boating or water navigation the *United States Coast Pilot* contains up-to-date nautical charts for the Great Lakes. The *Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance* is a searchable database of scholarships, grants, loans, training, and sales opportunities available to individuals, organizations and businesses.

If you need help, a reference librarian is available to guide you in your search or to provide additional resources and answers. Let your curiosity loose in some of the library's government resources. Remember, the federal government is a vast resource involved in such areas as the humanities and the arts, sciences and health, the military and taxes. All of this touches our lives as citizens. We invite you to explore and use the free resources and services that are available to you.

Zinio: The World's Largest Newstand

Your Library subscribes to the world's largest digital newsstand, Zinio! This database offers full digital copies of popular magazines that you can read on your computer or download to a supported Zinio Reader app for your mobile device. Browse hundreds of popular titles! There is no wait, no due dates, and no limits on the number of magazines you can download.



Zinio is accessible from home and is free with your valid St. Clair County Library card. To access Zinio, log onto the library's website at www.stclaircountylibrary.org, hover over **Find Information** and click on **Library Databases**. Scroll down the page until you find **Zinio** and click on the title. If you have any questions, you can call or stop in at your local branch and the staff will be happy to help you with set-up.

If you do not have a current card, just stop in at one of the eleven locations and the staff will be happy to assist you.

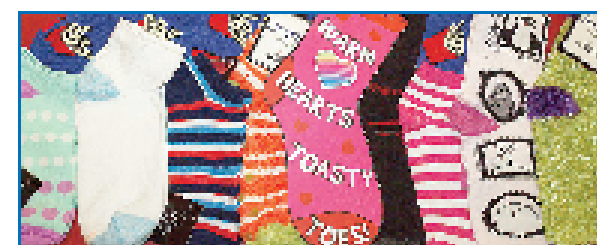
Did You Know?

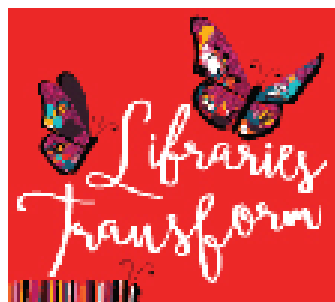

April 11 - 16



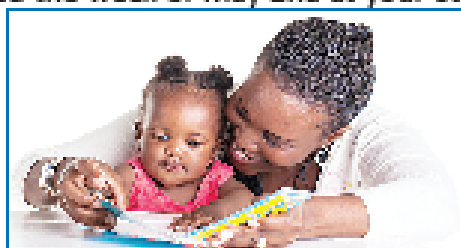

Ira Twp. Branch The Ira Library just became a cozier place with the addition of these two comfy chairs. What a great space to relax and read!



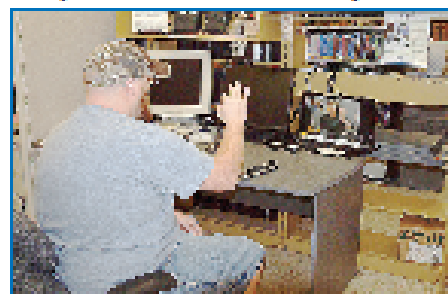

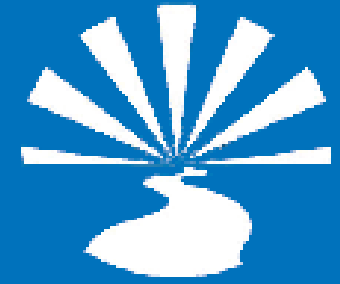
